Message from the Principal - Kathy Jones-Husch

How will you celebrate the 100th day of school? This long standing tradition is so pivotal for many students. It's an amazing accomplishment whether it is your first year of school or your 7th. The key is seeking ways to connect that special day with what came before it and what is yet to come. Your child has grown so much in both visible and invisible ways. You've come a long way, too, parents!

Our K-3 have just completed another round of provincial early literacy and numeracy testing. These standardized benchmarking tools give teachers one way of knowing where the kids are at this point in time, and can help inform how teachers will guide your child's learning. When the results have been published, we will share those with you so you can learn more about how you might help your child at home. Easiest support? Read with your kids every day. Pick books together, and focus only on the positives as you listen or read together. Take turns, read aloud, and share your own journey with reading. You sharing that special time is all you need to do, really, and you'll have a lot of fun, too!


With the 100th day of school coming, it's time to register for next year. Even if you already attend St. Pat's, everyone completing their forms ASAP gives us more info about how many new students might be able to attend. As a "School of Choice", our neighbour schools are also grateful when we can share our numbers early. So, don't delay! Be sure to update any changes in your information; if you want to come to school to use a computer, stop by anytime, and by all means, tell others about our little school!

Wellness Day was a huge success and we are so grateful to have shared it with guest presenters, parent volunteers and our talented staff who all shared their time and talents last week. If you haven't yet, be sure to ask the kids about their favorite moments. You might be surprised that some kids really enjoyed the quieter stops, including voga flow stretching or mindful colouring. Kids are so busy; many need a few extra breaks and enjoy the calm.

I've heard through the grapevine that many of you are frustrated with Spaces, to the point of avoiding it altogether. No reporting system is perfect, and even with its flaws, Spaces is THE program we use to report your child's progress on key outcomes through the year, as well as to give you a window into the classroom that can spark some good chats with the kids at home. Since teachers use Spaces as a key way to communicate with you, it is essential that you set up notifications for the Spaces app on your phone or check the website regularly. Of course, checking backpacks for samples of completed work does matter! Still have questions? Reach out to your child's teacher(s), attend our Parent/Teacher Interviews in March and give me a call if you need help connecting with teachers.

All in all, we are approaching the 100th day, and it is never too late to celebrate all of the great things going on for your child at school!



2025/2026 REGISTRATION



Re-Registration Starts January 13, 2025

Families with students currently enrolled in our system should expect an email during the week of January 13-17, 2025 asking that the online "Registration Update Form" be completed for each child attending one of our schools in the 2025/2026 school year.

Parents/guardians who are hoping to register younger siblings new to the division will also have the opportunity to do this at the same time that they re-register older students.

New Student Registration Starts February 3, 2025

All Early Learning to Grade 12 students who are new to the division and wish to enroll for the 2025/2026 school year are invited to register online starting on Monday, February 3, 2025.

- Through play, our **Early Learning Program** is designed to stimulate the growing curiosity of children 3 and 4 years of age.
- **Kindergarten** is designed for children 5 years of age on, or before, December 31, 2025.
- **Grade 1** registrants must be 6 years of age on, or before, December 31, 2025.
- French Immersion is also available. Enrollment starts:
 - o in Kindergarten/Grade 1 at École St. Mary in Lethbridge.
 - o in Grade 1 at St. Michael's School in Pincher Creek.

St. Ambrose 339-397 (Feast Day: December 7)

Proclaim! St. Ambrose was born in the year 339 in the northern part of the Roman Empire. It is said that as a baby, a swarm of bees settled on his face while he was in a cradle, leaving Pilgrims of the touch of honey on him. This is why bees are often represented with him as a symbol. To have a honeyed tongue means to be persuasive or sweet speaking — which Ambrose turned out to be as a preacher later in his life. He moved to Rome to study, and then worked in the government of the Roman Empire, becoming the governor of an area of what is today northern Italy in 372.

At some point in his adult life, Ambrose became a Christian, but he had not been baptized nor trained in theology when in 374, he suddenly became the Bishop of Milan! How did this happen? In the 300s, there was a priest named Arius who began to teach that (in very brief) God created Jesus, which meant that Jesus was lesser than (and unique from) God. These beliefs, known as Arianism, threatened to divide the church. In large part, this is why we have the Nicene Creed today. Ambrose was known to both sides of the conflict as charitable and seeking unity amongst Christians — which is why he was popularly installed. He was quickly baptized and ordained and became not only the Governor, but the Bishop. From there, he sought both unity and correct doctrine. He wrote extensively, corrected the Arians, and oversaw his diocese seeking to promote Christian unity — in fact, our popular saying today "When in Rome, do as the Romans" derives from St. Ambrose, as he responded to a controversy about local customs in the church. He died in 397, was popularly canonized, and is known today as one of the first four Doctors of the Church.



Hope

The Apostles' Creed "...[He] ascended into heaven..."

For many of us, this section of the Creed might reinforce a perception that we have about Jesus flying away, up into heaven at the Ascension. It might be worth questioning this perception. When we examine Jesus' bodily resurrection and ascension, we recognize that in this we too have hope for our own ascent to the Father; but what might that mean? We could consider that as closer union with God; not a change of physical location. We know also that Christ told the disciples that he would be with them until the end of the age — not away from them. So rather than thinking about him flying away into absence from us, we could ponder him remaining with us, present to us in every moment. In doing so, we can shift our question from 'What Would Jesus Do?" to "What is Jesus Doing?"

As we seek to become Pilgrims of Hope this year, let us continue to contemplate the Creed, and how our proclamation of the Creed unites us to one another and to all Christians through time and space.

Gospel Reading: Luke 5:1-11

One way is to begin by saying thank you for our blessings and remembering God has given them to us - we haven't earned them on our own. Today's Gospel shows us that if we listen to God and his commands, he will surprise us with blessings, just like Simon Peter was surprised by the HUGE catch of fish. Sometimes we'll receive enormous blessings that we can't miss (like Peter's catch of fish), but other times the blessings and graces will be small and it will take some thinking to recognize them. Let's not forget to thank God for those little gifts too.

Gospel Readings

February 16, 2025



6th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Gospel Reading: Luke 6:17, 20-26

"Blessed are you when people hate you, and when they exclude and insult you on account of the Son of Man. Rejoice and leap for joy on that day! Behold, your reward will be great in heaven." — Luke 6:22-23

The Gospel message today is a tough one. Jesus tells us that the poor, hungry, and the weeping are blessed. These are not usually the things we want to achieve in life. In fact, we typically seek out just the opposite. We strive for wealth, being well-fed, and enjoying happiness. When Jesus says "Blessed are you when people hate you"... is Jesus going too far? Yet that is the kind of life that he lived. He was poor, sometimes hungry, sometimes sad, and even hated by some people. Jesus doesn't want us to have to suffer, but he knows that humans do at times. When we are poor, hungry, weeping, or hated, he wants us to remember that he is with us. It is not fun to feel any of these things, but these experiences can remind us to rely on him.

When hard things happen to me, do I feel close to Jesus or far away from him?

Prayer:

Dear Lord, please give me the grace to accept hardships in my life as things that will help me to grow closer to you. Help me imitate your humility and remember your promise of blessing.

February 23, 2025


7th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Gospel Reading: Luke 6:27-38

"...love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you...do to others as you would have them do to you." — Luke 6:27-28, 31

In this day and age, this advice does not seem to be popular thinking. These days, we think more along the lines of "An eye for an eye," "Look out for number one," or "Don't let anyone get the best of you!" But Jesus challenges us to think in a more heavenbound manner. Do as he did. When his enemies came after him, he loved them. When people hated and cursed him, he did good things for them. We, too, are called to this. We can also think of this verse as saying: "Do to others as Jesus would do to them."

Who are the people I could do good for, even if they aren't good to me?

Prayer:

Dear Lord, open our hearts to love our enemies and do good to those who try to harm us. We ask for humility to see our own sinfulness, so we can share mercy with those around us.






