No, our return to work did not come with a bargained agreement (which is very concerning for the future of democracy), I do remain hopeful for the future of public education. There is now more awareness around how education is funded, there is renewed commitment to collect data on class size and class complexity and provincial leadership is saying, "we hear you" as they take steps to build task forces and fast-track building new schools in densely populated areas. As Catholics, we are called to lead with love and to remain hopeful in the face of adversity; I think, in some ways, our strong Catholic resolve has been essential to stave off any lingering negativity over some very trying days.

I am also overwhelmed with gratitude for so much! For our school division and board leadership, who ensured everything was looked after while we were away and were vocal in their support for teachers' actions. For our support staff who worked so hard on beautification projects and professional learning (and came out to one of the many rallies to show their support). For teachers and supporters all over the province who said, "I see you" and contributed to real action. And, most of all, for our students who continue to be curious and committed to their learning, showing trust in their teachers every day. Thank you to all of you who overcame your own challenges to support teachers and to always seek to understand our 'why'. The kids are worth it, both for now and for a future with a strong education system and a valued teaching profession. I am grateful and feel very blessed. Know that your children continue to be in good hands at St. Patrick Fine Arts and that our entire staff is here for them every day.






Monthly Parable Family Learning

The Parable of the Good Samaritan | Luke 10:30-37



A teacher of the Law came up and tried to trap Jesus. "Teacher," he asked, "what must I do to receive eternal life?"

Jesus answered him, "What do the Scriptures say? How do you interpret them?"



The man answered, "'Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength, and with all your mind'; and 'Love your neighbor as you love yourself."

"You are right," Jesus replied; "do this and you will live."




But the teacher of the Law wanted to justify himself, so he asked Jesus, "Who is my neighbor?"



Jesus answered, "There was once a man who was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho when robbers attacked him, stripped him, and beat him up, leaving him half dead.

The Parable of the Good Samaritan (page 2) | Luke 10:30-37



It so happened that a priest was going down that road; but when he saw the man, he walked on by on the other side. In the same way a Levite also came there, went over and looked at the man, and then walked on by on the other side.



But a Samaritan who was traveling that way came upon the man, and when he saw him, his heart was filled with pity. He went over to him, poured oil and wine on his wounds and bandaged them; then he put the man on his own animal and took him to an inn, where he took care of him.



The next day he took out two silver coins and gave them to the innkeeper. 'Take care of him,' he told the innkeeper, 'and when I come back this way, I will pay you whatever else you spend on him.'"



And Jesus concluded, "In your opinion, which one of these three acted like a neighbour toward the man attacked by the robbers?"

The teacher of the Law answered, "The one who was kind to him."

Jesus replied, "You go, then, and do the same."

In the parable, the Samaritan noticed the man on the road who others ignored. Jesus asks us to notice too. Think about your school, home, or community — who might need your kindness today?

Saint of the Month -St. John of God

St. John of God March 8, 1495 (Feast Day: March 8)



João Duarte Cidade was born in 1495 in Portugal into a poor but faithful family. As a child, he became separated from his parents and worked as a shepherd. Later, he joined the military and traveled through Spain to Africa. While in Africa, he had a vision of the Infant Jesus, who asked him to go to Granada. There, he changed his life and began helping the poor and sick, especially those needing medical care. Over time, people joined him, and they formed the Order of Hospitallers, which now helps take care of the Pope. John of God, as he became known, died of pneumonia on March 8, 1550.

Saint of the Month -St. John God

St. John of God — Love of Neighbour

St. John of God (1495–1550) lived in Spain during a time of great change and hardship. His early years were unsettled — he worked in many places, served as a soldier, and often felt restless and without purpose. After a powerful conversion experience, he recognized God's mercy in his own life and resolved to dedicate himself completely to serving others.

John began by caring for the sick, the poor, and those abandoned by society. He opened a small house of hospitality in Granada where he welcomed anyone in need. What set him apart was the way he treated each person: not as a burden or a problem, but as a beloved child of God. His compassion was practical — feeding, nursing, and sheltering — but also deeply spiritual, restoring dignity to those who were often ignored.

His example inspired others to join him, and after his death, his followers became the Brothers Hospitallers of St. John of God, a religious order that continues his mission worldwide. John's life reflects the call of the Good Samaritan: to cross boundaries, to see the suffering of one's neighbour, and to respond with generous love.



St. John of God and The Good Samaritan

St. John of God didn't always live a peaceful life. For many years, he struggled and made mistakes. But when he discovered God's love, everything changed. John decided to show that same love to others, especially people who were sick, poor, or left out.

He opened a small hospital where he cared for anyone in need. He treated each person with dignity, like they were his own brother or sister. Others were inspired by his example, and his followers still run hospitals around the world today.

Just like the Good Samaritan, St. John of God showed that loving your neighbour means stopping, noticing, and helping — even when it is difficult.



The name and grade of the person entering the poster should be included on the back of the poster.

All entries become the property of the Knights of Columbus Supreme Council. **Posters will not be returned.**
